This hand was played during a team event at the recently completed American Contract Bridge League (ACBL) Spring North American Bridge Championships which were held in Cincinnati. I held the North cards and my partner in the South seat was Albert Freeman of Cleveland.

Freeman, in first seat, made a standard opening bid of one spade. My one no trump bid was conventional and a part of our system. In this sequence the bid is simply a one round force and the start of many different sequences depending on the subsequent bid by partner. It is appropriate for the player in the South seat to announce "Forcing" when this bid is made to alert the opponents to the fact that it is not a standard bid. Freeman made the requisite announcement and then, at his turn, bid two spades.

This bid shows a hand with less than sixteen high card points and a six card spade suit. With sixteen or more points he would jump to three spades.

Had Freeman not shown a six card suit, I would have jumped to three spades at my turn to show a limit raise with only three trumps. A direct limit raise would have promised four card trump support. With the knowledge that partner has a six card suit, it is correct with this hand to simply bid the spade game.

The opening lead was the king of hearts and the dummy was revealed. Freeman immediately noted that he was faced with a potential loser in each suit. The ace of diamonds was not going to go away, and the king of spades may or may not be with West. The only possibility was that he could take action to avoid the club loser.

The first trick was won in the closed hand with the ace and the five of hearts was led toward the jack. West won the queen of hearts and exited with the king of clubs. Freeman was in control. He won the ace of clubs and crossed to dummy with the ace of spades. The good jack of hearts was a allowed him to discard his losing club and make ten tricks in all, five spades, two hearts, a club and two diamonds.

While this may look like a "thin" game, your opponents are going to bid it, so it is important that you do the same. Then, of course, you have to play up to your bidding.

A NEW PLAYER'S PERSPECTIVE

I remember a few summers ago, when my Mother invited me to Bridge. My first thoughts were, that I would be spending my weekend afternoon, sitting in someone's home; watching housewives play cards and listening to them swap krispytreat recipes. Imagine my shock, when I entered a large, air-conditioned building; with several card tables lined across the room and a few larger tables lined against the back wall containing delectable eateries and refreshing beverages!

It was then that I said to myself, "This could be interesting".

However, my discoveries were far from over. When the Players sat down at the tables, I witnessed a most extraordinary thing. I believe that it was the sudden wave of silence that filled the room which caught me on the hook. Next, each Player picked up their pre-determined hand and, in smooth clockwise motion, began to pull out colour coded cards for their biddings. Although there were four Players positioned at each table, only one player announced, out loud, the final bid. Then, the game began; like a cleverly choreographed dance around the card tables.

After thirteen tricks were made, almost simultaneously, at each table, two Players that sat opposite from each other would stand quietly and move to the next table. Then, the dance of the cards would begin again; until every table and every hand had been played by every player.

It baffled me where such self-control and non-verbal communication could be learned and mastered, well enough, to participate in such a globally accepted and competitive card game?

How fortunate I was, to discover several bridge instructors were attending that game. Needless to say, I waited quietly and patiently for the game to end and then approached one of the instructors of my choosing. I would have liked to begin my classes sooner, but they were already in the middle of a semester. Fortunately, I only had to wait a couple more weeks to begin my studies in the fabulous game of Bridge.

In bridge, it is important that you learn how to count cards and that you memorize which cards have already been played. It is, also, important that you study and practice as many "conventions" that you can. Conventions, as Bridge Players call them, are the various ways that you can play the hand that you've been dealt. Everyone is playing to win, but not everyone will be the winner in a single game. The only way to climb up to the "Big Leagues" is to study, practice, play, and most importantly compete.

The ABA is a global-scale organization. There's no excuse for anyone to say, "I can't find anyone that plays or wants to play Bridge." In the Great Lakes Section of the ABA is the Cleveland Congress of Bridge. It is located on 16400 Miles Ave. Cleveland, OH 44128. It includes 4 wonderful bridge clubs you might wish to visit this summer. They are: Burke Players, Woodmere Bridge Club, McGhee Premier and Fantastics Bridge Club.
